

Week 3 Patterns and Mark Making

Welcome to week 3 of Worthy, a project by NBAM. This week we are going to look at the type of patterns found on

banknotes. What is significant about them? What do they suggest to you, and how might you change or adapt them to bring them closer to your ideas of worthiness? You can relate this to the work you made in the two previous activities or do something completely different, it's up to you.

Have a close look at the type of patterns and lines on a banknote and you will see that they are extremely delicate and finely drawn - they suggest tradition, officialdom, perhaps authority.







The same kind of marks can be seen on things like passports, licenses and certificates.







Why do you think they have been designed like this? What else does it say to you?

What does the colour mean anyway?

In colour psychology, different colours mean different things. On our banknotes, certificates, licenses and visas, the colours we usually see are red, purple, brown, orange and blue. Here's what they mean:

- **£50** = **Red** Action, Aggressiveness, Danger, Energy, Love, Passion, Strength
- £20 = Purple Sophistication, Expensiveness, Fantasy, Mystery, Nobility
- **£10 = Brown / Orange** Calmness, Depth, Earth Roughness, Richness, Subtle, Utility, Woodsy
- **£5** = Blue Confidence, Dignity, Established, Serene, Power, Trustworthy

What are your favourite colours? Do you know why?

Show us your 4 favourite colours and tell us why you like them (we will let you know what they mean later on!)

What do you like about them? How do they make you feel?

Example: *"My favourite colour is pink. I love it because it makes me feel happy when I see it and it reminds me of flowers, new life and pretty vibrant scenes."*












Activity

Getting started


Use any pens, paint, pencils, crayons or art materials you like to use.


Experiment with mark making - use lines, dots, shapes, random patterns, without worrying about how it looks.
